Dear Steve:

Thank you for the opportunity to examine S.B. 3005, introduced before the 2nd Session of the 89th Congress by Senator Magnuson, relative to a coordinated national safety program and safety standards. It was indeed a revelation to comprehend the magnitude of the proposed United States traffic safety law to be considered by our Congress.

At the present time it would be difficult to determine whether or not our Company has any statistical safety information in our files which might be of assistance to the Senate Commerce Committee in their consideration of this Bill. Our experience in vehicle accidents does not indicate vehicle mechanical failure as a causative factor. It is my considered opinion that less than 1% of the accidents reported annually within our Company could be attributed to a mechanical defect or failure.

I was interested in Sec. 101(c), page 2 of the Bill. In the original draft our industry would have been exempt because of its regulations under the I.C.C. This has been amended and will now include the trucking industry. Admittedly, we have problems under I.C.C. regulations but to the present time they have been controllable problems. The amendment creates the question of what repercussions would the trucking industry encounter from local governments in their interpretations of the National Safety Act and its requirements. It is interesting to note that the International Teamsters Union is in favor of the trucking industry being included in this Bill. This can be attributed to the fact that they anticipate more advantages in monopolizing the activities of the trucking industry.

I note that Sec. 120, page 36: Sec. 202, page 38; and Sec. 303, page 43 appropriate approximately 5350,000,000 for proposed expenditures in the next 3 years. It is also noted that these monies would be appropriated from

the Highway Trust Fund. If the Highway Trust Fund is allocated for the sole purpose of highway construction, would this delay the national highway construction program which is of vital interest to our industry because our plans for continued progress are based upon the premises that the Interstate System will be completed and the realization of more permissible legislation regarding equipment lengths and gross weights on the highways.

Steve, this may not be of much assistance to you but I want to thank you for the opportunity to review this Bill and express my opinion on some of the terminology contained therein. As you are well aware, our primary concern is whether or not this Bill would benefit the trucking industry.

We are returning your copy of Senate Bill 5005.



We will appreciate very much your consideration of the views of Mr. Carr and can be available if further information or elaboration is necessary.


