DIFFERENCES BETWEEN HOUSE AND SEMATE VERSIONS OF S. J. RES. 1 -

PRESIDENTIAL IMABILITY

- 1. Sections 1 and 2 are identical.
- On page 2, lines 9 and 10, the Senate version refers to the "President of the Senate", whereas the House version refers to the "President pro tempore of the Senate".
- 3. On page 2, line 12, after "his office," the House inserted: "and until he transmits a written declaration to the contrary,".

The Senate version contains no such language.

- 4. On page 2, line 16, of the Senate version, insert a comma after the word "departments".
- 5. On page 2, line 18, the Senate version refers to the "President of the Senate", whereas the House version refers to the "President pro tempore of the Senate".
- 6. On page 2, line 23, the Senate provides for a "SEC. 5", whereas the House version merely provides for a new paragraph.
- 7. On page 2, line 23, the Senate version provides "Whenever", while the House version provides "Thereafter, when".
- 8. On page 2, lines 23 and 24, the Senate version refers to the "President of the Senate", while the House version refers to the "President pro tempore of the Senate".
- 9. On page 3, line 3, of the Senate version, insert a comma after the word "departments".
- 10. On page 3, line 4, the Senate refers to "seven days", whereas the House refers to "two days".
- 11. On page 3, line 5, the Senate version refers to the "President of the Senate", whereas the House version refers to the "President pro tempore of the Senate".

- 12. On page 3, lines 8 and 9, after the word "shall" the Senate version has the following language: "immediately proceed to decide the issue.". The House language is: "shall decide the issue, immediately assembling for that purpose if not in session.".
- 13. On page 3, line 9, after the word "Congress", the House version provides: ", within ten days after the receipt of the written declaration of the Vice President and a majority of the principal officers of the executive departments, or such other body as Congress may by law provide,".

The Senate version contains no such provision.
