1:30 p.m. In Conversation: Senate Historian Betty Koed and Senator Nancy Kassebaum Baker

Session 8 This year's former members spotlight is moderated by Senate Historian Betty Koed and built off of her recent oral history interviews with Senator Nancy Kassebaum Baker. When Nancy Kassebaum took the oath of office as a U.S. Senator, she became just the fourth woman elected to a full term to the Senate, and when she joined the Senate in December of 1978, there were no other female senators. That alone is worth discussing, but her three terms in the Senate, from 1978 to 1997, transcended gender to tackle such issues as foreign policy, international arms control, the budget deficit, labor and farm issues, and aviation. A political moderate, Kassebaum became known for her independence and her ability to build successful coalitions among her colleagues. This conversation will be followed by Q&A with the audience. *Open to the public.*
